



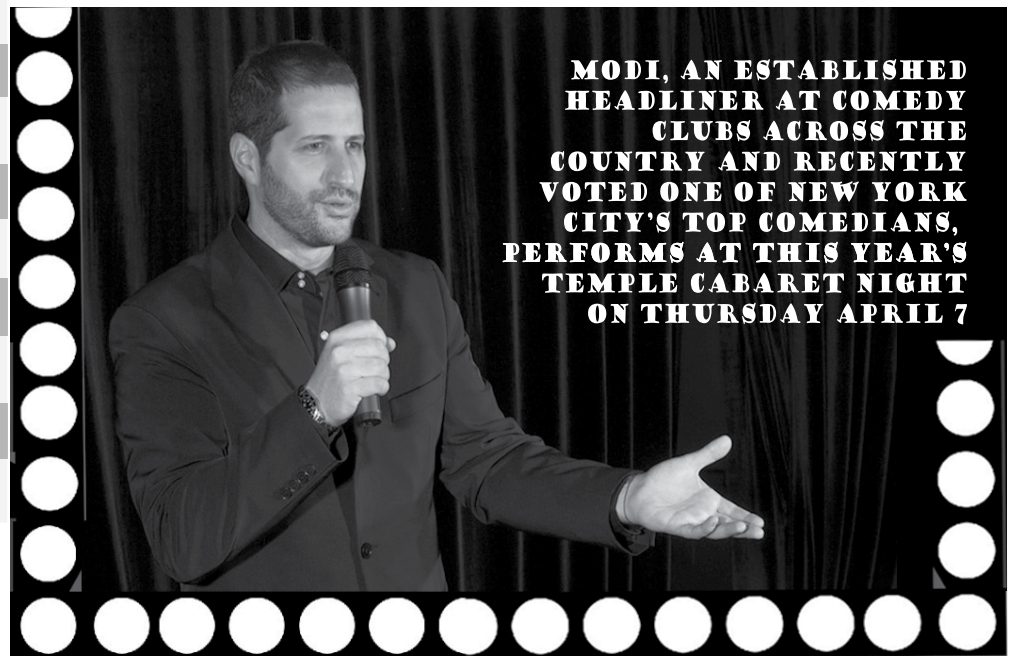

President's Message

Bill Sandy, one of our Vice-Presidents, opened a membership workshop with the distribution of packages of "M&M's" candies. His message was quite clear and appropriate. Every synagogue needs M&M's – money and members. To a synagogue, M&M's are its life's blood.

As to the former, money, our dues are commensurate to those of other congregations in our area and to other Reform congregations in cities of similar demographics. Our dues cover approximately sixty-two percent of our operating expenses. Not all of our members are financially able to meet what we request of them, so adjustments are made. No one is denied membership because of financial difficulties. The difference between what we collect in dues and what we expend is our "budget deficit." Thank goodness that many of our congregants respond to our appeals and fundraising efforts. On Shabbat, I frequently remind guests that if they appreciate attending our services, there are donation envelopes in the bookrack in front of them.

We all have heard and used the term "schnorrer" from time to time. To many, this is a pejorative term, implying begging to be a negative attribute. "Schnorrer" is also a respectable and honorable profession – that of fundraising. Many organizations would never remain viable except for the efforts of their member "schnorrers" or the efforts of professional fundraisers.

From the Rabbi's Study

A Magnificent Echo Chamber

In terms of hipness, Bible study doesn't rank very high these days. People tend to associate it with homespun church gatherings, prison ministries and cloyingly beseeching television evangelists.

In the perception of many Bible study has become a self-caricature that tends toward the simple-minded, portrays scripture as a cure-all for every life ill and emphasizes group-think at the expense of group-question.

Compounding this view among Jews is that our first introduction to Bible study usually occurs when we are made to compelled to prepare for b'nei mitzvah. The instruction we receive is often reduced to a relatively narrow religious dimension due to our age, maturity and level of sophistication.

Generally speaking, completion of b'nei mitzvah is regarded more as a relief than an alluring ticket to further Bible study. What else explains the legions of Jews who drop out of religious school soon after their thirteenth birthday?

Do we really expect Bible study to capture their attention when numerous other activities vie for their time and when their parents don't usually exhibit a very strong predilection for Bible study themselves?

Notwithstanding the religious pride and sense of achievement b'nei mitzvah engenders, the event celebrates the weathering of what is

known as the "cod-liver-oil" stage of Bible study, when it is taken like medicine. Some of us, through subsequent Jewish education, go on to the "shredded-wheat" stage when Bible study is perceived as nourishing but still rather dry. The "peaches-and-cream" stage is reached when Bible study is actually savored with fascination and delight.

Filled with less than enchanting memories of their early religious training and colored by stereotypic notions of what Bible study constitutes how can Jews ever aspire to, much less attain, the "peaches-and-cream" stage? How can such study be seen as a vitalizing reward of Jewish identity rather than an antiquated and extraneous aspect of it?

Perhaps this can be achieved through a more informed appreciation of the Bible's unparalleled role as a Divine-human touchstone and its capacity for exploration from a wide spectrum of ethical, social and spiritual perspectives.

In this way, the Bible functions as the proverbial violin that contains all its potential music within. What is just as important as the instrument is the dexterity and skill of the individual playing it. Likewise, the Bible's value is not found simply in the book itself, but in the capacity to elicit its wealth of possibility for meaning.

The tools of authentic Bible study are untrammelled curiosity, inquiry and imagination. The aim is not to arrive at predetermined conclusions but to yield ever new insights. Though the Bible's words maybe fixed, our potential interface is not. Even after thousands of years we continue to remain in dialogue with them.

The Bible represents a magnificent echo chamber where ancient voices

meet our own and the voice of God is sought in the ensuing reverberations. By opening windows onto myriad facets of the human condition, Bible study can become a profound vehicle for personal reflection and vision. It invites the rigorous application of our highest intellectual aptitudes not, as is commonly assumed, their suspension.

In closely examining an especially intriguing scriptural text we often seek to discover how prominent commentators like Rashi or Ibn Ezra (both of whose writings are now easily accessible in translation) have interpreted it. Though hundreds years may separate us our mutual pursuit confers a kinship that telescopes time. They come alive to us. This is the "peaches-and-cream" stage.

Don't let preconceived judgments of what Bible study is prevent you from enjoying the stimulation of what it can be. The "peaches-and-cream" stage is not reserved for rabbis and scholars. You can taste it too. But you have to be willing to conceive of the Bible as an ongoing adventure, not a land you think you've already visited and know all you need about.

Temple Beth Israel's Kallah Scholar Program will host Rabbi Aaron Panken, Ph.D., April 1 – 2. Rabbi Panken's talks will offer a fascinating presentation on "Myth, Magic and Mysticism: Judaism Beyond the Rational."

Judaism is a religion most often associated with law. Our most sacred books (the Torah, Mishnah and Talmud) are filled with regulations that dictate each area of life in very specific terms. But there is another aspect of Judaism, just as powerful and just as wonderful as the legal side, where feelings, superstitions, and belief serve to teach us incredible lessons that help us confront life's most important questions.

Join Rabbi Panken as he guides us beyond the rational in Judaism, defining the myth, magic and mysticism that have informed our people's lives in every generation, and the meaning we can derive from it in our own modern context.

Friday Night 8pm

"Confronting Myth and Magic," an exploration of Jewish texts to see how Judaism goes beyond its rational roots to explain the world in creative and fascinating ways.

Saturday 10am

"In Search of the Secret Meaning of Biblical Text," a study of the fascinating and often bizarre reinterpretation of core Jewish texts.

Rabbi Panken is an Assistant Professor of Rabbinic and Second Temple Literature at Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion in New York where he has taught since 1995, and served as Dean from 1998-2006. He serves on the faculty of the Wexner Graduate Fellowship Program, is involved in a number of leadership roles within the Reform movement, and travels widely as a speaker and teacher in congregations throughout the United States.

Friends Forever, President Harry S. Truman and Eddie Jacobson

Instructor: Elinor Borenstine - Eddie Jacobson's Daughter, Introduced by Ruth Gorton

Date: Thursday, March 3

Time: 2:00 p.m.

Eddie Jacobson, a traveling salesman from Kansas City, played a crucial role in the founding of the modern state of Israel. Jacobson and Harry S. Truman were friends from Missouri. After successfully managing a canteen together during basic training they opened a men's clothing store following WWI. Though it failed Jacobson remained close to Truman, often visiting him in Washington when he served in the Senate and in the Oval Office.

In March of 1948 Jewish leaders prevailed on Jacobson to persuade Truman to meet with Dr. Chaim Weizman, leader of the Zionist movement. A couple of months later, the U.S. became the first nation to recognize the new state of Israel. Jacobson's daughter, Elinor Borenstine, who lives in Sarasota and sits on the Honorary Board of the Truman Library, will share fascinating anecdotes regarding her father's relationship with President Truman.

Living, as we do, in a country dominated by the Christian faith in all of its various denominations and socially bombarded by Christian theology in the pre-Christmas and Easter seasons, relatively few American Jews spend any time at all considering the possibility and the timing of the Jewish Messiah - the Mashiah. Yet, our liturgy, both home and synagogue based, is sprinkled with vague messages about this special visitor's potential arrival. We will examine references to the Mashiah found in the Bible, our synagogue liturgy, in the Midrash and in the Passover Haggadah.

Bill Hild has served as pastor of First Baptist Church of Sarasota, a prominent congregation located downtown for more than a hundred years, since 1997.

Pastor Hild holds a keen interest in and affection for Israel. He has pursued graduate work in archeology at Hebrew University and participated in several archaeological excavations in the country, most recently last summer.

He has also led numerous groups to Israel and travelled extensively throughout the Middle East.

A native of Savannah, he received his BA in Religion at Carson-Newman College and a Masters of Divinity from Baptist Theology Seminar in Wake Forest, North Carolina.

Pastor Hild will share the Baptist perspective on the Middle East today and speak about his own personal experience of Israel's history and people.

While he looks forward to providing a Christian leader's outlook, he also is eager to learn more about Israel from a Jewish perspective. There will be ample time for questions following his presentation.

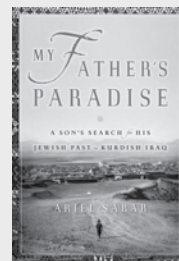

Arianna Huffington, the new editor-in-chief of AOL's news content, is the cofounder and editor in chief of The Huffington Post, a news and blog site that has become one of the most widely read and frequently cited media brands on the Internet. She is also a nationally syndicated columnist, a frequent guest commentator on the Sunday morning news programs and the author of 13 books, the latest entitled *Third World America: How Our Politicians Are Abandoning the Middle Class and Betraying the American Dream*. 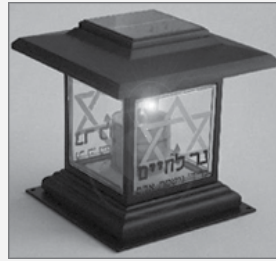
