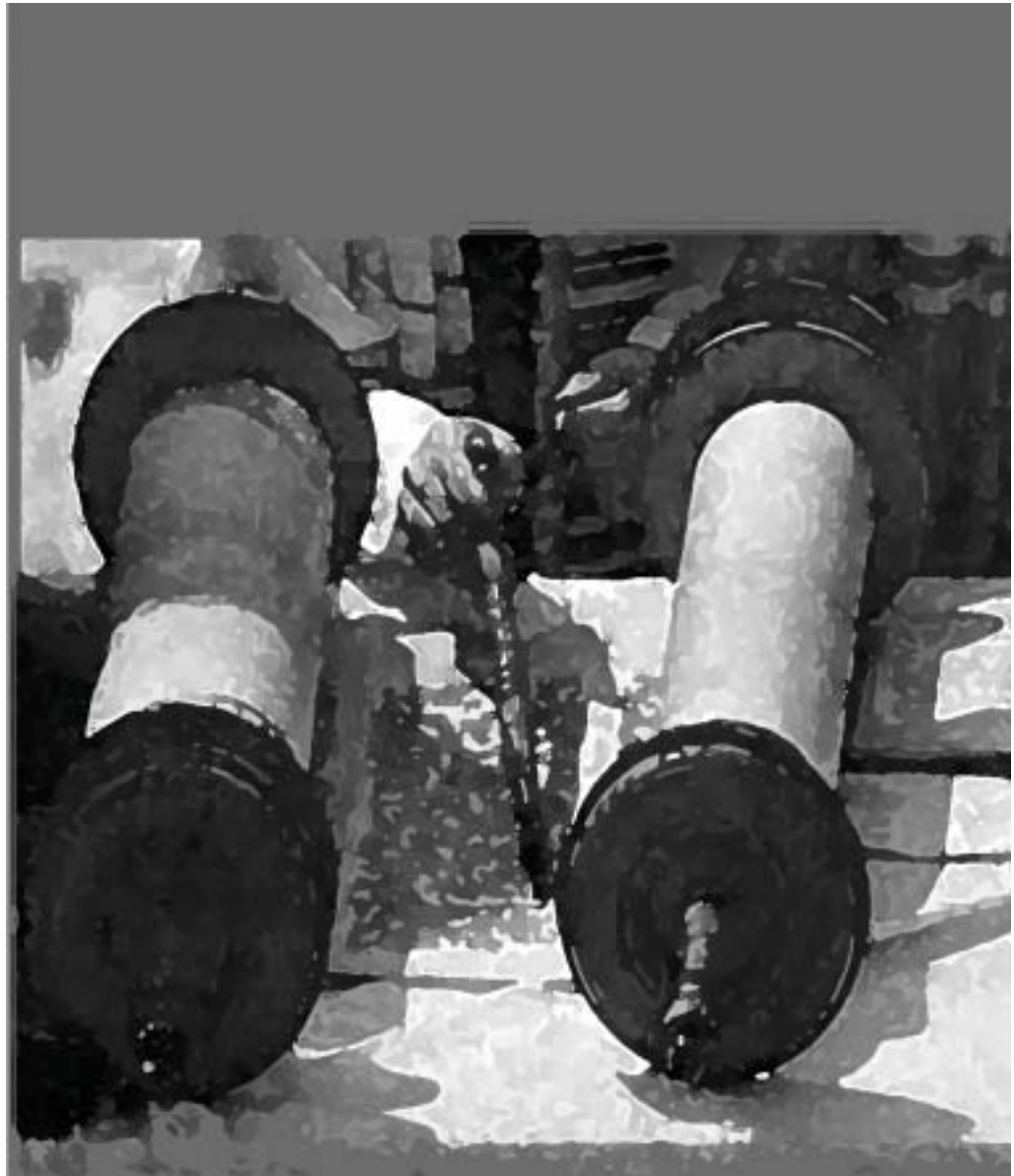

L' Shana Tova

As we stand at the dawn of a New Year, as your President, I would like on behalf of the Officers and Board of Trustees to wish each and every one of you a sweet and happy New Year.



What an awesome sight from the Bimah to see so many of our Temple members here, together, to pray, sing and share another year with Rabbi Michael Eisenstat, Cantor Robert Bloch and our wonderful Temple Choir, who add so much to the beauty of our worship. I am so honored to be able to have this unique vantage point.

While these days of awe are a solemn period of reflection in our lives, this evening and Kol Nidre evening serve another purpose as well. Some have called them the annual meeting of the Jewish people, and there is truth to that.

I'm certain that all of you are aware that Rabbi Eisenstat will be retiring in July 2008, and at that time become Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Beth Israel. I want to take this time Rabbi, to thank you for your dedication to us and our Temple these past ten years, for enriching our lives and our spirits, for strengthening our Jewish connection, for making our Simchas so special and easing our pain in times of sorrow. You have touched and given so much meaning to our lives. I am privileged to speak on behalf of the hundreds of people here this evening in saying, thank you, with all our hearts and with all our souls. Todah Rabah.

At this highly significant moment, I would like to take a couple minutes to give you a sense of the state of our congregation, sense of the mission of the congregation, and an idea of where we're headed. I would also like to lay out the challenge and opportunity for each of us. I won't subject you to some grandiose State of the Temple Address, but want to share a few basic thoughts with you.

We live in a time when it is both a pleasure and, sometimes a challenge to sustain our Jewish institutions and our proud Jewish way of life.

Temple Beth Israel is now in a time of transition, with the inevitable awkwardness that implies. For those who are comfortable with the status quo, change is coming too quickly. And for those determined to move forward, progress sometimes seems painfully slow. Both are correct. In recent years we have come to realize that Temple Beth Israel is not a growing institution, and may even be a shrinking one. We have an obligation to balance our spending with our resources. We are meeting that obligation now, and thinking about how best to do so in the future. Nonetheless, change we must and change we will. In many ways, change will come naturally. The question before us is precisely how do we change? We need to strengthen our bonds with our loyal members who have supported our Temple for so many years...we need to give a lot of love to our new members so they come to feel a part of our Temple family, and we need to spread the word and induce others to join us.

Our Temple is very special. We serve our members well, and will never stop looking for ways to serve them better. We are members of a good community that deserves to be shared. We need to be developing a culture in which we will be more welcoming. We have never in recent years actively recruited. I am asking all of you, as members to spread the word to your friends and neighbors who are potential new members. I'm asking each of you to become an ex-officio member of the Membership Committee. I know there is the potential for 100 plus new members this year. This could become a reality with your help and enthusiasm. If half of you brought in one member, our goal could be easily reached. Let's open our arms and reach out to our community. Let's rename the Membership Committee the "Haimisha" Committee.

The energy is starting to flow. This coming year we will have Greeters and Board Members at our Shabbat services. We are developing a core of volunteers who will help when needed in the office, give rides to members who cannot get to Temple on their own, visit the home bound and serve lunch on Temple Tuesday to our seniors. Our Sisterhood and Mens Club have a full calendar of events. Our Temple Lecture Series, Miniversity of Judaism, Thursday Nite at the Movies, Young People Concerts, Lunch with the Rabbi, Books and Brown Bag, are all part of what the Temple has to offer.

I understand what needs to be done is not a simple or quick process. Like all journeys it will be the sum of many small steps. Like all journeys it is often more about the trip than the destination. Like all journeys it is important to begin. Let's begin tonight. Temple Beth Israel is "the center for Jewish life on Longboat Key."

I want to wish all of you a year of peace and quiet, health, prosperity and happiness.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY....

Every once in a while, things really seem to work out well. Such a result is particularly gratifying when things had appeared to be

heading toward disaster. Case in point: the visit of Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad to New York in general, and to Columbia University, in particular. The Iranian President had been invited to speak at this venerable Ivy League university a year ago, but the visit was cancelled on the basis of security concerns. This time, however, the security concerns were met. The police were out in force. Despite the urgent pleas of many not to provide this misogynistic, gay bashing, Holocaust denying, wipe-Israel-off-the-face-of-the-map "world leader," Columbia's administration declared itself for "the free exchange of ideas," and invited him to speak.

What were the concerns of those who opposed his appearance at Columbia? For one thing, Professor Edward Said had long exerted anti-Israeli efforts during his tenure at Columbia. Second, so many college students, particularly at elite, liberal universities, tend to be anti-establishment, anti-government, pro-"underdog" so that it appeared to be a sure bet that they would eat up and swallow whole the anti-Israel, anti-United States attitudes that Ahmadinejad was sure to espouse.

But that is not what appeared to happen. The night before he spoke at Columbia, Ahmadinejad was interviewed on "Sixty Minutes." The very issues mentioned above were the questions that reporter/interviewer Scott Pelli put to the Iranian President. Again and again, Ahmadinejad evaded direct answers, bobbing and weaving and trying to divert the issues being discussed to items on his own agenda. When, the next day, he was introduced by the President of Columbia University, it was, among several other insults, as a "petty dictator." Once again, Ahmadinejad dodged issues and was even derisively laughed at when he denied the very presence of homosexuals in Iran, let alone executing them!

While he further lost credibility with his American audience, one can only wonder what will happen when he goes back to Iran. While his Columbia debacle was not broadcast, surely the "powers behind the throne" will have had a full report. One wonders whether they will be pleased with the way he has represented Iran, whether or not he presented his country as a peace-loving, cultural center, or as a center of terrorism and repression of human rights. Has he eased the pressure for economic sanctions against Iran or has he increased them? Has he made a mockery of Holocaust denial or has he increased its appeal? That is not to say that he drew no applause or

struck no sympathetic chords when he spoke of the Palestinian people. (The very fears many of us had at the outset) Still, on balance, it seemed like things worked out pretty well.

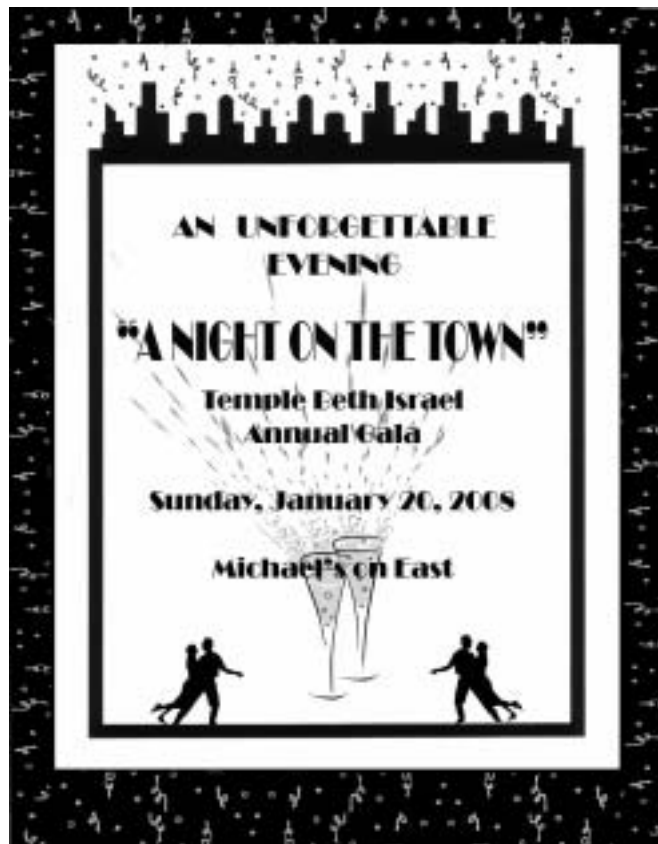

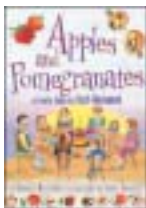
