MIRIAM MILLER – A TEMPLE TREASURE



Once again the Temple Beth Israel Library has been the recipient of both first level and Advanced Level Certification from the National Association of Jewish Libraries. The NAJL is an international organization of 1000 member libraries; only one dozen are recipients of the advanced coveted award. Inclusion in this prestigious group is attributable to the professionalism and expertise of the temple librarian, Miriam Miller.

For the past 16 years, Miriam has spent hours expanding the library's collection, working with her volunteers, advising the Books and Brown Bag group on their selections, and helping to bring the library's facilities into the 21st century. This quiet, self-effacing southern lady has a background grounded in libraries and religious institutions.

Miriam Miller was born and grew up in a small Mississippi town, called Marks, the only town started by Jews in Mississippi, according to Miriam. She attended the University of Alabama, where she met her future husband, Seymour; and received a Master of Library Science from a small college in Missouri. She was a Media Specialist for the Superintendent of Education in Lexington, Missouri and subsequently worked in synagogue libraries. When she and her husband moved to Cincinnati, she worked at the Rockdale Temple and brought their library up-to-date. Upon their next move to Atlanta, she organized the children's library at The Temple, and their last move to Sarasota brought Miriam to Temple Beth Israel where she has been overseeing the TBI collection.

The temple library, considered one of the finest collections of Judaic material on the southwest coast of Florida, consists of some 5000 books, dozens of videos, CDs, magazines, newspapers and a vertical file of clippings on pertinent Jewish subjects. Books can only be taken out by temple members, but others are free to browse or use the reference material that stays in the library. Many members who attended Friday night services would remember Miriam's husband, Seymour sitting in the library waiting for her to finish talking to and helping patrons. One week after a big celebration with family in honor of their 60 years of marriage, Seymour Miller died in October, 2005. There are four Miller sons, nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild. There are many temple members who have worked to make the library the outstanding facility that it is, but it is a very special southern lady who has brought it all together in its present state: Miriam Miller, a temple treasure.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY....

CONSIDERING OUR PARTS

Quickly recognized at a prominent cultural gathering, a famous actor was asked to offer a recitation of the Twenty-third Psalm. At the appointed time he rose from his seat and gave a stirring reading. A thunder of applause followed. Everyone knew they were in the presence of a master performer.

The next speaker, an elderly preacher, quietly asked if he too could recite the same psalm. Gazing upward he closed his eyes and began. The hall quickly stilled. A few moments later, when the preacher concluded, total silence reigned. There was no applause, but neither was there a dry eye.

Later, someone approached the actor. "I don't understand it," he reflected. "You both said the same thing and your presentation was letter perfect. Yet when the preacher spoke in his slow, halting manner, people were moved too deeply for words. What made the difference?" "I know the Twenty-third Psalm," replied the actor, "but he knows the shepherd. That's the difference."

The preacher had spoken from personal experience, from a knowledge mined in the crucible of his soul. His wasn't a performance. It was a revelation.

When Shakespeare famously wrote, "All the world's a stage...And one man in his time plays many parts" he understood that the human drama demands we assume a range of roles.

Sometimes, however, rather than defining these roles, we can come increasingly to be defined by them. This occurs when we begin to feel trapped in our jobs, relationships, and outlook. We experience an absence of intimacy and personal investment in what we say and do.

From a distance all may look in order as the curtain rises. Yet though we may have our lines down perfectly, we can still be emotionally and spiritually immobilized.

The High Holy Day period serves as an intermission in our stage work. Our tradition provides this time to enable us to consider our parts more closely so that we might live with greater insight into personal character, direction and value.

The preacher in the story knew his heart as well as his role. It made all the difference.

That difference is what the High Holy Days seeks to inspire us to reach for.

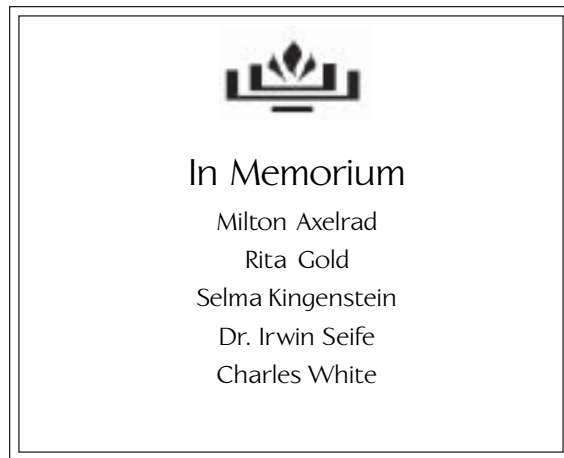
