AUDIO VISUAL ENHANCED AT TBI



An exciting enhancement will soon be available to Temple Beth Israel: an expansion of our capability to show video and satellite broadcasts in BOTH the Social Hall and the Sanctuary at the same time.

This is driven by the increasing popularity of the 92nd St. Y programming through the new partnership of the Gulf Coast Community Foundation of Venice and the Rabbi Sanford Saperstein Memorial Fund. Not only will we be able to offer more seating, we will have much less preparation work in setting up all the chairs in the Social Hall unless needed.

The installation will consist of a portable rolling cart that will hold the projector, a large portable screen that will stand on the bimah, and a new set of electronic controls for better managing presentations. We will be able to show content from the 92nd St. Y satellite receiver; DVD; VCR; Internet; and simultaneously if desired.

In addition, new ceiling speakers will be installed in the Social Hall to improve the quality of the audio.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY....

LITTLE, BUT SO LUMINOUS

The story of Hanukkah is not mentioned in the Hebrew Bible. Rather, the triumph over the Syrian-Greeks in 165 BCE is found in the books of First and Second Maccabees. These books belong to the Apocrypha, a collection of texts that, for reasons we don't always know, were not included in the canon of the Hebrew Bible.

Interestingly, the miracle of the oil that lasted for eight days is not even found in the books of the Maccabees. We come across it much later as a legend recorded in the Talmud. Due to Hanukkah's lack of Biblical canonical status it is, theologically, regarded as a minor holiday in Jewish tradition.

However, as we all know, Jewish children don't find anything minor about the Festival of Lights. I certainly recall how much I looked forward to its eight special nights as a youngster. Dreidels were spun on everything from the dining table to the kitchen floor to my father's shoulder. Chocolate gelt and latkes were devoured immediately on sight.

In our home the presents increased in value as we moved towards the holiday's last night. I delighted in learning that my parents had indeed received the many hints I'd dropped regarding what gifts I'd like to receive those last evenings.

But beyond all the spinning dreidels, gelt, and even gifts, what made Hanukkah so enchanting were the lights. My family took time to pause to admire their simple beauty. Casting our eyes on the luminous little candles brought a gratifying sense of calm, strength, and hope.

As the Hanukkah lights glowed, we looked into each others eyes and felt enveloped by precious bonds of relation. Gazing on this outward expression of faith kindled an inward consciousness of thanksgiving. No matter what else may have been happening in the world, we recognized just how many blessing we still enjoyed. When this happens, Hanukkah surely becomes a major holiday.

Hanukkah means "dedication." The lighting of the candles reminds us of the unfaltering religious dedication that originally inspired the observance of the festival. Peter Yarrow wrote in his stirring Hanukkah anthem, *Light One Candle*, "Don't let the light go out, it's lasted for so many years, Don't let the light go out, Let it shine through our love and our tears."

Indeed, don't let the light go out. Let it continue to shine through our Jewish pride and convictions.

This month is so filled with holiday celebrations and family gatherings. To make your spare moments extra fulfilling, I call your attention to new books that have vivid stories:

Rashi's Daughters, Book III by Maggi Anton. The final book in the epic historical trilogy about the lives and loves of the great Talmudic scholar Rashi's three daughters.

The Fruit of Her Hands by Michelle Cameron. A 13th Century woman is raised and educated like a son by her widowed father.

Day After Night by Anita Diamont. The author of *The Red Tent* creates a cast of four young women, who escape to Israel from Nazi Europe.

If You Awaken Love, by Emuna Elona Set in Israel between the Six Days War and the assassination of Yitzhak Rabin, it's the moving story of a girl's love-hate relationships with the men in her life..

All Other Nights by Dara Horn. The author of *The World to Come* weaves a tale of adventure, taking place during the Civil War, featuring conflicts between Jews of the North and South
Sonata for Miriam, by Linda Olsson. Composer Adam Anker embarks on a journey to uncover his family's past, taking him from New Zealand to Krakow, Poland, and ending in Sweden.

Defector by Daniel Silva. The ninth book in the popular series about Israeli art restorer and spy, Gabriel Allon, who comes out of retirement to take on a former KGB agent.

A Mad Desire to Dance, by Elie Wiesel. The author, a winner of the Nobel Peace Prize, tells the story of a man whose life is shaped by the horrors of the 20th century.

In January, when we turn the calendar pages to more serious structured activities, I will discuss other brand new volumes that stretch the mind.

Movie Night

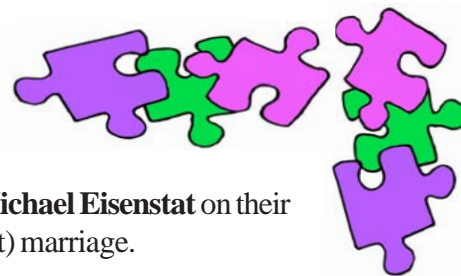


Walk on Water –In English although there is some Hebrew and German (with English subtitles).

Water is our most vital natural resource. That's why its availability, safety, and treatment have become increasingly important issues both locally and around the world.

All water treatment facilities are not the same. The H2O we drink in Florida is treated differently than the water found elsewhere in the United States. To learn more about the state of our water, a special tour of the water treatment facility serving Longboat Key has been arranged for Beth Israel members on Wednesday morning, January 6.

We will discover where our water comes from, its quality, treatment and future. Rabbi Katz will also offer insights about the significant role water has played in Jewish tradition and history.

This program is another in a series of Tikkun Tours sponsored by the Temple's Social Action Committee. While the morning promises to be fascinating, space is limited. The tour will last from 10:30-11:45 a.m. Just last month the *New York Times* featured a front page article (that also appeared in the *Sarasota Herald Tribune*) about the growing issue of water and waste treatment.
