## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Milestones are important for they give us the opportunity to measure how far we've come and how well we're doing. They also give us guidance on how to proceed into the future. Temple Beth Israel is about to celebrate an important milestone as it turns 30 years old in 2009.

It was in 1979 that a group of people decided there should be a Jewish presence on Longboat Key. They began holding services in their homes but soon needed more space. A community room in a local bank was their next meeting place. Eventually, they moved on to the social hall of St. Mary Star of the Sea Catholic Church on Gulf of Mexico Drive.

Clearly, this new congregation was catching on and so in 1985, through the strong financial generosity of its members, they were able to build their own house of worship – our Temple Beth Israel – and they accomplished this with no mortgage debt. Our founders were given the opportunity to select the number for the Temple's address and they chose #567, three numbers that added up to eighteen. What better way to describe the new synagogue than "Chai." Over the years, as the congregation continued to grow, the need for additional space became an issue and so there have now been two major expansions to the original building.

Along the way, with guidance from spiritual as well as lay leadership, the Temple's religious services, educational programs and social activities flourished. In addition, a sense of community developed along with a feeling of being part of Chavrim – "friends." You can feel this warmth of belonging when you enter our doors.

Today Temple Beth Israel is seen as a light unto the Jewish community as well as to the community at large. We encompass high ideals and deep humility. We understand how to be good neighbors and we respond to those less fortunate. We share bonds with each other which bring joy and fulfillment to our lives and in trying times we know we will not be alone. And so our year of celebration is to begin. We have much to be thankful for: for the vision of those who helped establish our synagogue and for the leadership that has worked so diligently to keep us moving forward.

We will mark our Temple's 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary with a beautiful Gala on January 11<sup>th</sup> at Michael's-On East and pay homage to those who came before us. It is now our turn...Temple Beth Israel is in our hands...please join us for a wonderful evening and support the Gala which is our Temple's major annual fundraiser. Let us continue the mission our founders began those 30 years ago. We owe this support to them. We owe it to ourselves.

## TEMPLE LECTURE SERIES

Under the auspices of the Speakers Committee, chaired by Sy Klionsky, Temple Beth Israel has been the beneficiary of two annual lecture programs: The Scholar-in-Residence and the Kallah Scholar programs featuring prominent American and Israeli scholars.

The Scholar-in-Residence this year is a weekend lecture series that will take place during Worship Services on Friday night, January 23, at 8:00 PM; Saturday morning, January 24 at 10:00 AM; and culminating in a Sunday breakfast, the 25<sup>th</sup>, at 9:30 AM, hosted by the Men's Club.

The speaker for the weekend series is Dr. Norman Cohen, Provost of the Hebrew Union College Jewish Institute of Religion in New York. He received his Ph.D. in Midrash, which is the ongoing examination of Scriptures as they relate to everyday life.

On Friday night, Dr. Cohen will discuss "Through the Prism of Midrash—Our struggles as Children and Parents." On Saturday his topic will be "What Can We Learn from Moses—the Human Being?" At the Sunday breakfast, Dr. Cohen will speak about "Abraham's Journey from Haran to Moriah: The Journey of every Family."

The Scholar-in-Residence Series is underwritten by the Edith (z'l) and Jay Rudolph Endowment Trust. Reservations are required for the breakfast, hosted by the Men's Club at a charge of \$10 per person.

The Kallah Scholar this year is Blu Greenberg, author and lecturer, who has published widely on contemporary subjects of feminism, orthodoxy and the Jewish family, among other issues of scholarly interest. More information on this series will be forthcoming. The Kallah Scholar series is underwritten by the Ruth (z'l) and Gerard Daniel Endowment Trust Fund.

Since the inception of these programs, the Speakers Committee has brought a wide spectrum of distinguished American and Israeli rabbis and scholars from various institutions of higher learning, both in Israel and in the U.S. to our Temple. They have discussed topics of broad interest to our congregation, such as what is happening in the American Jewish movement, relationships of Israel with Christians and its Arab neighbors and an overview of the American Jewish historical experience, just to name a few of the topics.

## FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY....

### THE NEED TO BE MALADJUSTED

As a child, whenever I saw or heard Martin Luther King Jr. I thought about how "together" he seemed. Our nation's preeminent civil rights champion was so confident of his convictions, so eloquent and so true to himself.

What made for Dr. King's compelling persona? What enabled him to stir the hearts and minds of so many? What engendered the remarkable unfolding of his powers as a leader? King himself provided the answer.

"Modern psychology has a word," he said, "that is probably used more than any other word. It is the word maladjusted." Though maladjustment usually presumes a negative connotation, King, on the contrary, identified it with sacredness.

Dr. King, whose life will be commemorated at services on Friday January 16, appreciated that we should all try to live well-adjusted lives. However, there were certain things to which he was proud to be maladjusted. "I never intend to adjust myself to segregation and discrimination," he preached. "I never intend to adjust myself to mob rule. I never intend to adjust myself to the tragic effects of the methods of physical violence and to tragic militarism. I call upon you to be maladjusted to such things."

His inspired maladjustment, his impassioned rejection of an unjust status quo, captured my imagination and soul.

King found models of maladjustment in the ennobled protest of the Hebrew prophets. "I call on you to be as maladjusted as Amos," King insisted, "who in the midst of the injustices of his day cried out in words that echo across the generation, 'Let justice run down like waters and righteousness like a mighty stream.'"

Conscience-driven iconoclasts like Amos and Jeremiah spoke deeply to King. In fact, when one examines our history from Biblical times to the present, holy maladjustment appears to be very much at the center of what it means to be a Jew.

Of course, maladjustment isn't always manifested in positive ways. Some wield it as an axe to be perpetually grinded as an end unto itself. Others use to excuse inappropriate behavior. Maladjustment can give license to an anger that serves to darken rather than constructively alter the horizon.

This is what made Dr. King so exceptional. He transformed maladjustment into purposeful dissent and, ultimately, love. His dream that we be "so maladjusted that we will be able to go out and change our world and civilization" speaks to us today. In a world still fraught with injustice and hate, we must continue that much more to cherish and learn from King's profound legacy.



### RABBI KATZ TO FACILITATE BETH ISRAEL INTERFAITH ISSUES PROGRAM

Many Jewish families include interfaith relationships that pose challenging situations. For example, should grandparents raise objection if their grandchildren have a Christmas tree in their home? Can grandchildren be raised in two religions? Should grandparents simply accept that their grandchildren are being raised in non-religious settings as a result of a mutual decision by their interfaith parents not to introduce either of their religions in the home? What role should Jewish grandparents play in religious upbringing of their grandchildren?

These issues will be explored at a special program led by Rabbi Katz on January 15 at 10:30 a.m. at the Temple.

## RABBI URI REGEV RESIGNS FROM THE WORLD UNION OF PROGRESSIVE JUDAISM

Preeminent Rabbi Uri Regev, who was our Kallah Scholar last March and who has made several appearances at Temple Beth Israel, has announced his resignation as president from the World Union of Progressive Judaism, which he has served for the past seven years.

He has a long history of forwarding the interests of Progressive Judaism not just in Israel but internationally. Before becoming president of the World Union, Rabbi Regev, who also holds a law degree, was founding chair and later executive director and counsel of the Israel Religious Action Center (IRAC) promoting religious pluralism, social justice and human equality.

Despite his busy schedule, he and his family manage to take time out to visit his in-laws, Temple members Al and Bib Grossman during the year. We at Temple Beth Israel have come to know Rabbi Regev and to support his views. We wish him success in his new endeavors.

List the number of soft cover books, the number of hard cover books, and the date of the donation. Ask your accountant for guidelines for tax returns.

The Librarian will look over the books to see what will be added to the collection. Others are put in the Library Book Sale, and the money collected goes into the Library Fund.

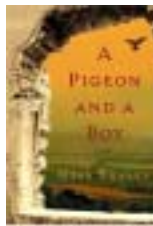

In that capacity, he directed the National Economic Council, which President Clinton created after taking office. As the first director of the NEC, Rubin was credited with making the system work, spurring economic growth and making America's economy the strongest it had been. He served as our nation's 70th Secretary of the Treasury. Sebastian Mallaby works for the Council on Foreign Relations as the director of the Maurice R. Greenberg Center for Geoeconomic Studies.

### RABBI ERIC YOFFIE TO ADDRESS SARASOTA

On Sunday, January 25, Rabbi Eric Yoffie, President of the Union for Reform Judaism will address the Sarasota community with a major speech about Israel and the Reform Movement. Rabbi Yoffie is the keynote speaker on Sunday, January 25, 2009 at an 8:00 PM. dessert reception at Temple Sinai honoring Sarasota's own Gerry Daniel, a major figure in the Reform movement. ARZA: The Association of Reform Zionists of America will present Gerry with their prestigious Lifetime of Israel Achievement Award for his tremendous support of Israel over the past 60 years. This event is chaired by Elaine and Don Weill of Temple Israel, Naomi and Bruce Wertheimer of Temple Sinai, and Bonni and Mark Schlanger of Temple Emanuel.

Gerry and Ruth (z'l) helped establish the first Israeli Reform synagogue – Beit Daniel – in Tel Aviv in 1991 and Mishkenot Ruth Daniel Education & Culture Center and Youth Guest House in Jaffa in 2007 – now renamed the Daniel Centers for Progressive Judaism. Today, their children, Miriam – a member of the ARZA board – and Ralph, are committed to continuing the family tradition.

This event is open to the community. Tickets are \$10. Community members are also encouraged to make a donation to ARZA in honor of Gerry Daniel. Funds raised through this event will help launch a new Daniel Centers program, **Tikkun Olam in Tel Aviv**. College graduates from the Diaspora will live in Tel Aviv, volunteer within the underprivileged community alongside Israelis who share their passion for social justice. They may also intern with the Israeli Reform movement or other liberal institutions. **Tikkun Olam in Tel Aviv** – with the encouragement and participation from ARZA and the URJ – expands upon short-term programs created by NFTY and Birthright. It offers young adults meaningful opportunities to deepen their Jewish identity and commitment to Israel through study, social justice work and internships that will build our future Jewish leaders.

ARZA, the Association of Reform Zionists of America, is the Zionist arm and voice for the Reform Movement in the United States.
